Applicant Essay

To whom it may concern,

My name is Mason Collie, and I am a student at the University of Houston. Fall 2022 is my second semester at UH. I previously attended Texas A&M- Galveston from Fall 2020 to Fall 2021. I graduated from Archway Academy in Spring 2020 as Valedictorian of my class. While this is an achievement I am proud of, it came with much hardship and difficulty.

Before attending Archway, I was spiraling into severe drug an alcohol abuse as a high school junior. Due to subsequent legal trouble, I was withdrawn from that school, placed in an adolescent rehabilitation facility, and entered a life of addiction recovery. Since March 28th, 2019, I have not consumed a mind-altering substance, an achievement for which I am proud. But how does this qualify me for an endowment, one may ask? Sobriety is only the means in which I am able to be successful and help others, not a grand achievement in it of itself. I am much more interested in discussing my accomplishments after hitting my rock bottom.

After treatment, I joined a community of young people called Cornerstone. The program is designed for staying sober and treating self-destructive behaviors. I learned a lot about the importance of integrity, community spirit, and service work for others. Service is a huge part of my story. As a member of both Cornerstone and Alcoholics Anonymous, part of the experience is picking up a sponsor. A sponsor is someone who is able to teach the 12-Steps and the principles of recovery. My sponsor, Mark, is that person for me. We met after a recovery event, and after speaking to him for a few minutes, I asked him to sponsor me. I didn't ask him because he was particularly successful in the material sense. I picked up because he met me, a dishonest and self-centered newcomer who was scared witless, with real, vulnerable human understanding. He treated me with patience and kindness that I had never known, and I didn't even ask for it. I

feel that being taught the principles of recovery, not by a councilor, probation officer, clergyman, or teacher, but by just another alcoholic like me is the only way I could have recovered. That relationship has continued, and Mark is still my sponsor to this day.

Months after I began working with Mark, I took up my own mantle as a sponsor in order to freely give that which was given to me. I have shared my program of recovery through the 12 Steps and my experience, strength, and hope in the form of sponsorship with over thirty young men, eight of which are still actively working with me on a weekly basis. With the help of a Higher Power, I have been able to effectively and compassionately apply my experience in order to give the gift of recovery to many who wouldn't have had the opportunity otherwise.

Archway Academy, the high school designed for recovery that I graduated from, was another vessel in which I was able to be of service, and it showed me the importance of combining education and recovery. As the Student Body President of my class, I was able to graduate at the top of my class, a moment that seemed lost to me at one point. I then began my journey in higher education at Texas A&M University- Galveston, not without major difficulty. I experienced extreme mental health issues, and as a result, I felt somewhat lost. My family refused to help me financially due to legal and treatment fees, so I was on my own financially. Therefore, I had to figure out how to support myself financial since then. I was commuting from Galveston to North Houston every weekend to work as a server at Olive Garden, and then Little Pappacitos. On top of that, I kept up with all of my service commitments to the recovery community. However, despite these hardships, I refused to give up. I decided in Fall 2021 to pursue medicine, a more fitting career for me, as it has real purpose and meaning, and it combines my passion for science and service.

Transferring to UH has been the best decision I've made for myself. Attending school closer to my apartment has allowed me to spend time on myself doing things such as collecting vintage vinyl records and comic books, reading science fiction, doing yoga, mountain biking, golfing, and participating in softball tournaments. Attending Archway taught me the importance of combing recovery and education, so I decided to join Cougars in Recovery (CIR), a very similar program to Cornerstone for people in recovery from substances, mental health, and self-destructive behaviors. I have subsequently co-founded the Steering Committee within CIR, the service and community outreach arm of CIR. This semester we plan to take 12-Step meetings to treatment centers, feed the homeless, and organize sober tailgates for the university football games. I've also become a trained mentor for CIR in which I am in a position to help freshman students and transfer students have a smoother transition into higher education, and I'm also in the unique position to say, "I've been there." My past truly has become my greatest asset, and as a result of Mark forming a bond with me, I still carry the torch of service and mentorship to others.

All of these accomplishments notwithstanding, I'm far from being done. I completed a summer internship with the UTHealth OB/GYN department that sparked an interest in women's health and wellness, and as a result I will be attending two mission trips, one in April to Guatemala and two in May and June to Ghana and Greece, where a team of physicians and I will perform well-woman exams, administer birth control to those who want it, and provide education to rural parts of these countries. I am applying for an internship at MD Anderson to shadow physicians who are fighting cancer. I am starting a new job with the Maternal-Fetal Medicine department of Memorial Hermann in which I will act as a Research Support Assistant. Even more so, I am seeking new ways of being of service to my community and to grow in my

connection to God. All of these reasons are sufficient to prove that I am a deserving student of the FindRehab.org Educational Scholarship.

Mason's input in our class discussions was invaluable, as he took them in directions that I had not contemplated, allowing the entire class to explore interesting concepts. His curiosity knows no bounds, as he possesses a deep knowledge of anything from literature to music to medicine. Likewise, Mason is a gifted writer. One of his papers in my class covered an astute analysis of James Joyce short stories, demonstrating superior analytical skills, voice, and a command of the language.

Inside and outside the classroom, Mason is a natural leader. In class, his consistent engagement and curiosity was infectious and inspired his peers to do the same. He is also a leader in the world of recovery, guiding others both in the way he lives his own life, but also as a sponsor to many. He leads naturally and with humility, again speaking to his maturity. Mason aspires to be a doctor, and with his drive and skill set, I believe he will make that happen.

As an exceptionally mature and bright individual who is driven to excellence, and as a leader among his peers, Mason would make an excellent candidate for your scholarship. For these reasons, I enthusiastically recommend Mason.
